Fitting to a Single Page

As has been recounted in other issues of *WordTips*, the differences in appearance and printing of a document from one system to another is due to a variety of factors. Differences in versions of Word, installed fonts, printer drivers, and even video cards can cause differences in how a document appears and prints. The only sure-fire way around this problem is to convert the document to a PDF format using a program such as Adobe Acrobat. There are a couple of things you can try, however, with the document itself.

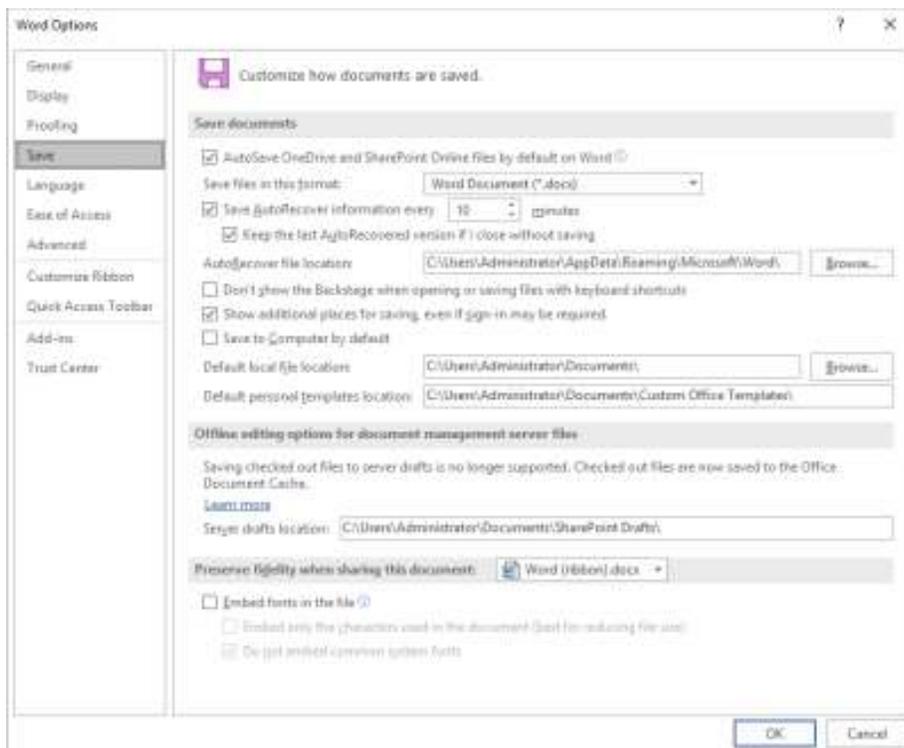


Figure 1. The Save options in the Word Options dialog box.

First, you can make sure that when the document is saved, you embed TrueType fonts within it. You do this by displaying the Word Options dialog box, clicking Save at the left side, and then making sure that the Embed TrueType Fonts (or Embed Fonts in the File) check box is selected. This should overcome any system differences that are solely due to issues of which fonts are installed on the systems. (See Figure 1.)

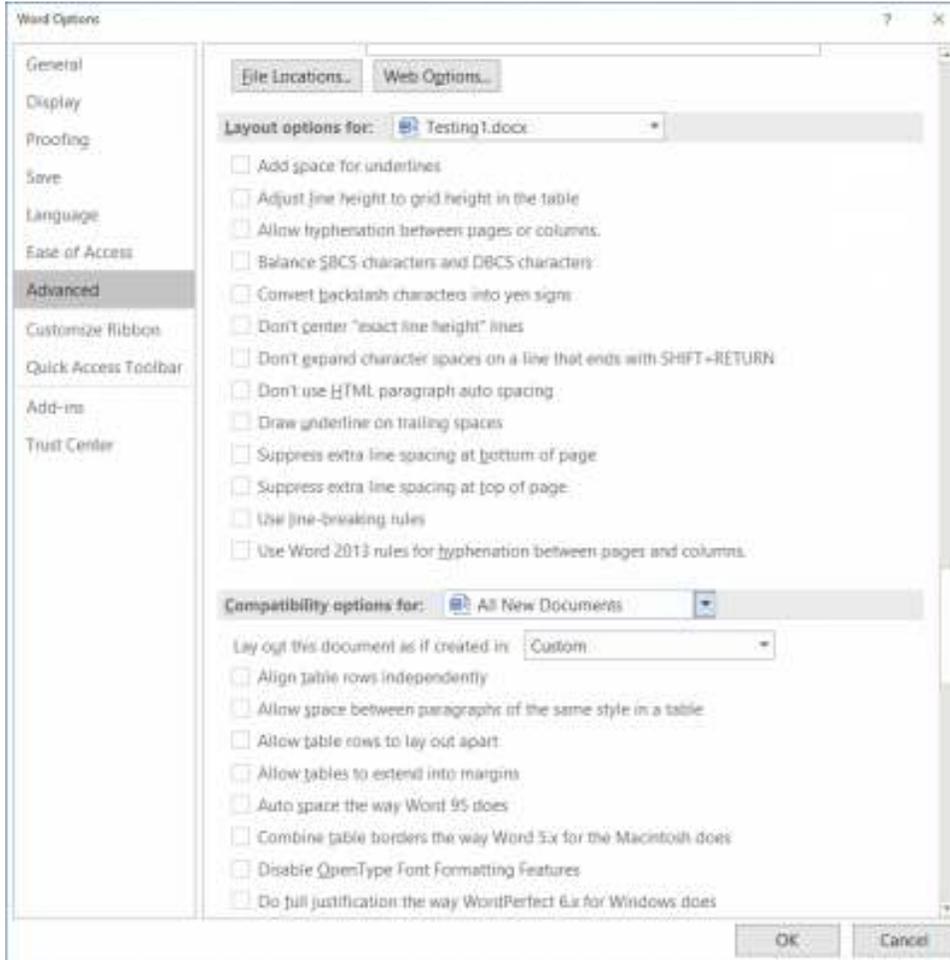


Figure 2. The Layout options of the Word Options dialog box.

You can also adjust the layout options in Word 2007 or Word 2010 to make sure that the Use Printer Metrics to Lay Out Document option is selected. Again, display the Word Options dialog box, click Advanced at the left, scroll to the bottom of the options, and click Layout Options. In later versions of Word, display the Word Options dialog box, click Advanced at the left, scroll to the bottom of the options to locate Compatibility Options. If there are not options listed under this heading, then click the drop-down arrow and choose All New Documents. Scroll down until you see Use Printer Metrics to Lay Out Document option and select it. This can help ease some differences (but not all differences) between printers that are introduced by different versions of Word. (See Figure 2.)

It could also be that if the problem document is using the Normal template that the styles in the Normal template on each of the systems are defined differently. If this is the case, then the solution is to copy the Normal template from one system to the other. Be careful in doing this, however, as it can affect other customizations on the target system and may cause unintended consequences in other documents. You should also only consider copying the Normal template if both systems are using the same version of Word.

As far as forcing a document to a single page, Print Preview offers a "Shrink to Fit" button. This reduces the number of pages in the document by one so that you can prevent a small portion of the document from spilling onto another page. There are risks in using this tool, however—it can mess up some of your formatting. You will want to experiment to see if it works for your particular needs.

Fix Printer Problems with an Uninstall and Reinstall in Windows 10

"Reformat and reinstall" just your printer, and you may find that things start working again. It's a safe and easy first step to fixing printer issues.

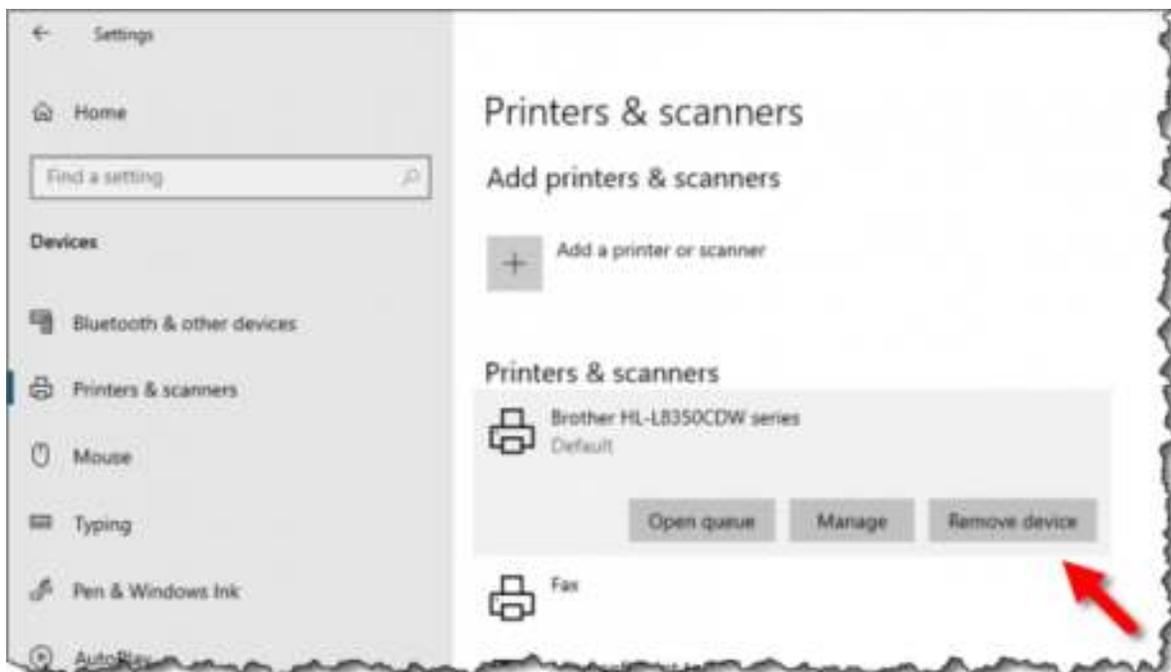
Printers and printing have long been their own special source of frustration in Windows. From early days to the present, printers have been known to behave oddly – and even stop working on occasion.

It's gotten better, especially when it comes to installation, but random frustrating things still happen.

I don't have a solution for everything, but I do want to share the first thing I do when a printer goes away. I'd say it resolves over half, maybe as many as 80%, of the cases I'm asked about. Use the Windows 10 settings app to remove your printer from Windows and then add it back again. Doing so re-initializes much of the printer's configuration information. While this approach doesn't solve all problems, it's a safe and easy first step to fixing printer issues.

Uninstall the printer

As counter-intuitive as it sounds, the first step is to uninstall the printer from Windows. In the Settings app¹, click on **Devices**, then **Printers & scanners**. Click on your printer, and underneath, it click on **Remove device**.



“Remove

device” button in the Printer listing. (Click for larger image.) You'll be asked to confirm.

Are you sure you want to remove this device?

Click on **Yes**, and the printer will disappear from the list.

Re-add the printer

Click on **Add a printer or scanner**. Windows will scan your local [network](#) for printers, as well as any that are physically connected to your computer.



Adding a printer.

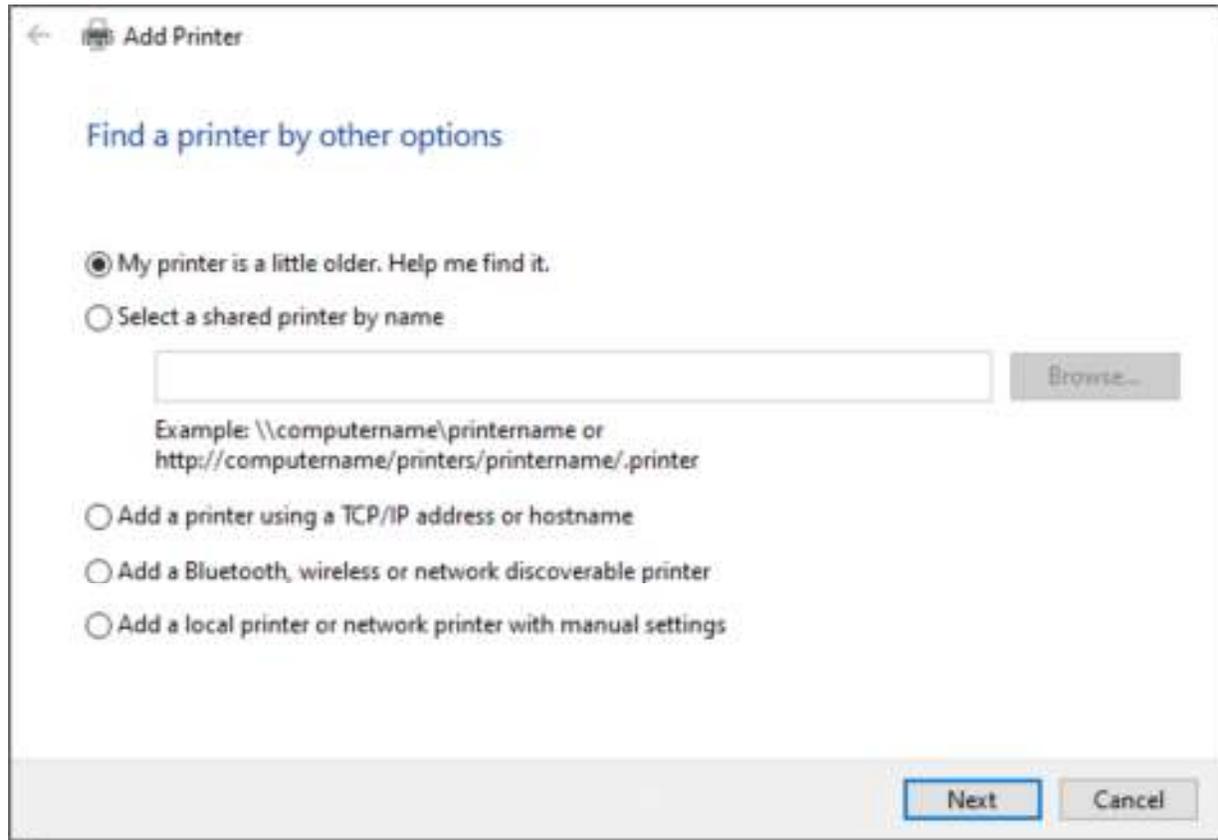
When your printer appears, click on it. Windows will reinstall it.

Most of the time, this is all you need.

Adding a printer that's not found

If, after some time, Windows has not found your printer automatically, click on **The printer that I want isn't listed** for a list of alternative ways to install the printer.

Finding a printer by other means.

These are more advanced techniques, and may require that you have additional information (such as specific printer names or IP addresses) or skills (understanding manual settings) at your disposal.

There's another approach not listed that's actually more common and easier to perform: click on Cancel, and then visit the printer manufacturer's website for the latest drivers and/or installation program for your specific printer. If available, that's generally as simple as running the program and perhaps answering a few questions (remember, [never choose default](#)), after which your printer is re-installed.

What did we just do?

I liken it to a "reformat and reinstall" of your computer, except limited to the printer. By uninstalling and then reinstalling it, most settings are re-initialized to their default state, and the [driver](#) is configured for the correct, current state of your machine.

As I said, it doesn't fix everything, but it does fix a surprising number of problems. It's a good and generally safe first step when tackling printer issues.

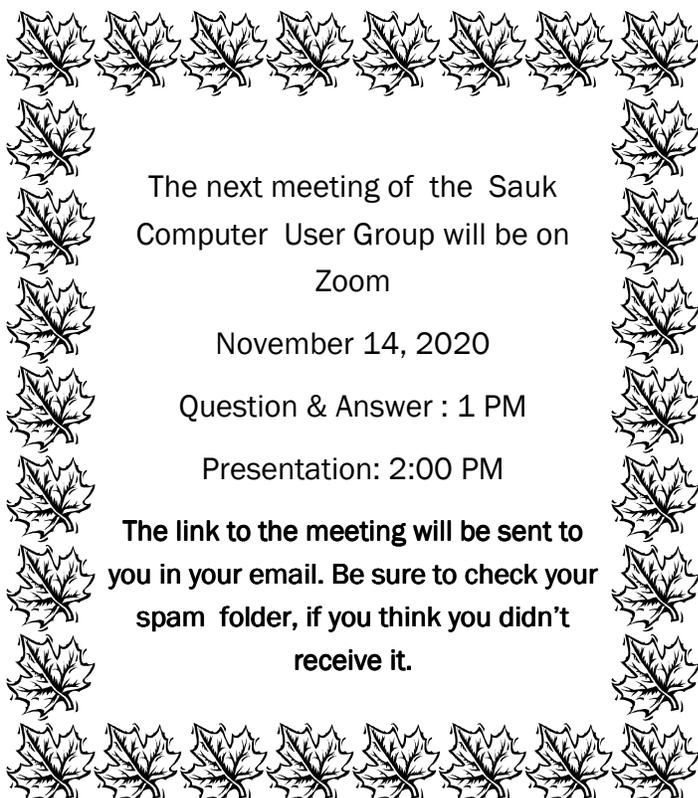
